In his book of the same name, Congressman and activist, John Lewis tells the story of growing up as the son of a sharecropper in Pike County, Alabama. He recalls one afternoon when a severe thunderstorm rolled in and his aunt called him and his fifteen young cousins and siblings into her small house for shelter. As the wind grew stronger, a corner of the small structure threatened to lift from the ground. His Aunt Seneva instructed the small children to hold hands and walk across the floor to the corner to weigh it down. Throughout the storm, the children walked from corner to corner to hold the house in place.
